

## Enhance Your Stay in Málaga with Additional Privately Guided Sightseeing

**Full-Day Excursion from Málaga to Caminito del Rey:** Sit back and enjoy the chauffeured journey from Málaga northward to Caminito del Rey. Constructed in the early 1900's for workers at a nearby hydroelectric plant, it's a nearly 2-mile path built directly into the sides of a cliff hundreds of feet above the roaring river below. Once the dam was completed in the 1920's, the path was no longer needed by workers and it fell into disrepair. Even with crumbling concrete and rusting steel supports, the "Little King's Path" continued to draw thrill seekers—earning the nickname, *The Most Dangerous Walk in the World!* Fully rebuilt including new handrails and wooden boardwalks, Caminito del Rey reopened in 2015. Though the precipitous drops and adrenaline-rush views are still there, it's now a popular trail for walkers and hikers of all fitness levels. With your expert guide leading the way, the full walk will take two to three hours *Tour Duration: 8 hours including roundtrip transfers from Málaga* 

Full-Day Excursion from Málaga to Gibraltar: The chauffeured journey along Spain's southern coast from Málaga to Gibraltar takes less than two hours. But on arrival, you'll be in a British Overseas Territory, so be sure to bring your Passport! First settled by the Moors in the Middle Ages and later ruled by Spain, the outpost was ceded to the British in 1713. On arrival, your guided exploration includes the Rock of Gibraltar; from the 1,400-foot summit of this monolithic limestone promontory, you'll have breathtaking views that stretch all the way to Africa on a clear day. You'll also visit the Apes' Den, home to free roaming Barbary macaques, and explore St. Michael's Cave. Once believed to be bottomless, legends grew that Gibraltar was linked to the African continent by a network of subterranean passages that could be accessed from the cave. *Tour Duration: 8 Hours*
